Advantages

- Extremely beneficial for **Art History** Lesson at Senior Cycle incorporating ICT elements, written work, reading, sketching.
- The one hour class is better suited for practical classes as opposed to a 40 min class more time for making and for cleanup at the end.
- Allows for more time for **preparation** in between classes setting up of
 space example Lino printing / Batik. Displaying work / corrections etc.
- Accommodates more time and space for student's voice and choice -

evaluation of work / peer assessment.

Advantages

- More leeway for adding in other components during one class period drawing / walking tour outside for example.
- Less movement throughout the day on the corridors.
- Less books/materials required in one day for students to carry.



Challenges

- Differentiation: Careful planning needed for students in **Transition year** who may not be so interested in the subject.
- For some Junior classes, the hour, can seem long for some particular students they may benefit from having an extra project to be working on in order to retain **focus** example CBA work & Knitting.
- For some groups i.e juniors there is less **contact** during the week.
- Consideration needed for students who require a movement break among other **needs**.



Junior Cycle and Senior Cycle Timetabling

Example of timetable:

- Junior Cycle; Two periods a week per timetable
- Senior Cycle;

Sixth Years - Four periods a week

Fifth Year - Four periods a week

For Senior Cycle; one period for art history & three for practical classes.

Impact on Teaching and Students' Learning Experiences

- ✓ Evaluation of work



Homework/Classroom Work

- Homework and classroom work are different.
- Differentiating between work done in class while a teacher is present at all times vs. when they are at home and there is no teacher present.
- Avoid falling into bad habits at the end of lessons example: starting homework.
- Less classes in one school day allowing more time for each homework in each subject.







Short Term Planning

- ✓ Ensuring quality of engagement throughout lessons.
- ✓ Inclusion of formative assessment
- ✓ Incorporation of more active learning strategies

Long Term Planning

- ✓ Possibly giving an oversight to seniors of the yearly plan.
- ✓ Covering all units over a number of weeks art/craft/design
- ✓ Factoring in the formative and summative assessments.
