Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) is key to implementation of the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals. The Department of Education published the National Strategy on Education for Sustainable Development in 2014 and since then considerable work has been done integrating the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) themes and principles into:

- the curriculum
- initial teacher education and continuing professional development
- the assessment and inspection processes

An 2018 interim review of the ESD Strategy details the work done to date and the work still to be done.

ETBI Take 1 Programme



The Take 1 programme was developed by Education and Training Boards Ireland (ETBI) from a desire to support senior leaders, teachers, and students in ETB schools and to embed the Sustainable Development Goals in teaching and learning.

The TAKE 1 programme aims to make the data about the 17 goals available and understandable. The resources for the TAKE 1 programme show how to engage with the goals in a formal setting for all Junior Cycle subjects, and then turn that engagement into action.

During TAKE 1 Week in December 2019, each teacher was asked to teach about 1 SDG to 1 Class group over the course of 1 Week.

The TAKE 1 programme has received endorsement from the Centre for Schools Leadership (CSL) as providing Leadership Learning.
