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1. ESD to 2030: Ireland's New National Strategy on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD)

Ireland's new strategy on Educational for Sustainable Development will shortly be published.

ESD to 2030 is the Second National Strategy on Education for Sustainable Development developed in consultation with key stakeholders and co-sponsored by the Department of Education, the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, and the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth

ESD to 2030 aims to: Align public policy with ESD; Transform learning environments; Increase educator capacity for ESD; Empower and mobilise youth and; Engage with local communities.

It builds on the successes of the first National Strategy for ESD (2014-2020) and aims to support the achievement of Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4.7, as well as being a key enabler for the achievement of all other SDGs. The strategy provides a framework to steer and support the contribution that the education sector is making and will continue to work towards a sustainable future over the next 9 years. It is accompanied by a 4.5 year implementation plan 2022-2026, with an interim review planned in 2026 to evaluate progress and identify any additional required actions to 2030.

The strategy embodies a lifelong learning approach, spanning the continuum from early years to third level education and research, and extending beyond to engage with local communities, youth groups and enterprise.

3. LCETB School Orienteering Event for May Day for Sustainability

On Monday 9 May, Limerick and Clare Education and Training Board organised an orienteering event to celebrate the **ETBI May Day for Sustainability** with an emphasis on sustainable Development Goal number 15 - Life on Land.

In the early morning, over 500 students from post-primary schools throughout Limerick and Clare headed for Curraghchase Forest Park in Co. Limerick, a fantastic amenity which covers 313 hectares of mixed woodlands, park land and lakes which together provide a rich habitat for a diverse range of animals and plants.

Three separate orienteering courses were set out, with students competing in pairs across their allocated course, setting off over two-minute intervals throughout the day. While the emphasis was on participation and successful completion of the course, medals were awarded to the first three pairs who completed each of the three courses. Additional medals and some fun SDG prizes, provided by Education and Training Boards Ireland Take 1 Programme, were also shared with participating schools.

Conscious of living the spirit of SDG 15 – Life on Land the organisers promoted the message of leave no trace, ensuring participants minimised their impact on their environment by encouraging a 'pack it in and pack it out' ethos, reminding all students to leave no litter.

This event was co-ordinated by Gina O'Connor from the LCETB Education Team and supported by Joanna McInerney (Burren Outdoor Education Centre), and Keith Bickford (Kilfinane Outdoor Education Centre).





4. Multimedia Projects on Climate and Sustainability - Free Summer Course

5. SEAI Climate Science Champions - Teacher Summer Course

The Teacher Summer CPD Course 'Climate Science Champions' with the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI), Discover Primary Science and Maths (DPSM), and the European Space Education Resource Office (ESERO), will to return this year and take place at Airfield Estate, Dublin 14.

The course will run from 4 - 8 July. The course will help teachers to teach children about climate change in a hands-on and practical way through inquiry-based learning. It will look at the science behind climate change and the role of space exploration in understanding the planet and its processes. Participants will learn how to teach about this important topic in a positive and solutions focused way.

The course also looks at the links between climate change and wellbeing by connecting children with the natural world and involving them in making simple positive changes in school and at home. The course has links to Social, Environmental and Scientific Education (SESE) with integration of other curriculum areas such as numeracy and literacy.

Teachers attending this course qualify for 3 EPV days.

6. National Tree Week in Coláiste Chiaráin

This year's National Tree Week was quite the event in Coláiste Chiaráin with staff and students planting 2,000 native Irish trees throughout the 22-acre campus.

Planning for this ambitious project began approximately one year ago and came to fruition this year for National Tree Week.

As part of the school building project an area of the school site has been set aside to create a biodiversity park. Over the past two months the school has been fortunate with the local support that facilitated the sponsorship and installation of approximately 400 metres of a walkway throughout this area, making it safe and accessible for staff and students. This part of the project was made possible with the sponsorship and support of Ger Lynch of Tallybrook Engineering, Richard O'Donoghue TD, and Lynch's Quarries. Coupled with this local support the school has also been fortunate in working at a national level with the Irish Tree Council, Coillte, and Crann. This support provided approximately 2000 native hardwood trees which have been planted in the biodiversity park and throughout the expansive school campus. The species planted included Beech, Oak, Birch, Silver Birch, Alder, Whitethorn, Rowan, Holly, and Sycamore. This project will support teaching and learning alongside wellbeing while also contributing to the promotion

of biodiversity and offsetting the carbon footprint of the new school.

Commenting on this project, Principal Mr. Gerard O'Sullivan stated:

"What a wonderful and eventful National Tree Week 2022 that we have just had. It was so rewarding to work with staff and students throughout the week planting our biodiversity area, which will become a tapestry of native woodland for staff and students to enjoy for decades to come. In the context of the global challenges, we face for both climate and biodiversity, I am so proud that our school is playing its part and has managed to complete this ambitious project that will create a biodiverse rich native habitat for many years to come. We are so grateful for the support of all who have made this possible. What a wonderful amenity for our school community to enjoy for many years to come.

It was a real treat to have Éanna Ní Lamhna, ecologist, broadcaster, and President of the Tree Council of Ireland with us to plant some trees and officially launch the project during National Tree Week."

7. Outdoor Learning at South Lee Educate Together National School

Brian Dunphy, a teacher at South Lee Educate Together National School, a

developing school in Cork City talks through the school's Outdoor Learning programme which is used for a multitude of purposes, one of which is to underpin and develop the ESD curriculum within the school:

"When we talk about Outdoor Learning at South Lee Educate Together, what we mean is our children being given regular opportunities to experience and learn outside the traditional classroom context. What that means in practice is a daily programme of lessons grounded in the theme of native Irish animals that are conducted outside of the classroom within the CSN campus grounds.

There is an extensive body of educational and health research that demonstrates that learning outside benefits children's academic performance, social competencies, self-confidence and physical and mental wellbeing.

Our programme seeks to build on our children's innate sense of wonder and curiosity about the natural world around them to deliver the Irish primary curriculum as set out by the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NCCA). Subjects such as Primary Language (writing and speech), Science, Maths, Geography, Drama, Visual Arts, Physical Education are delivered in a crosscurricular, holistic (and most importantly for the children!) fun way.

Through the programme, we aim to develop the children's understanding of the natural world and hence create an emotional connection with nature that will remain with the children for their lives. Research shows that building positive early life experiences with nature creates adults that are invested and committed to ecological preservation and protection.

Most importantly, our children have told us that they love learning outside!

8. Sustainability at Lucan Community College - Update

Lucan Community College and their work on sustainable fashion were featured in Issue 5 of the ESD Newsletter and received a €500 voucher for ESD at their school.

Teacher Gráinne McKeever shares the progress that they have since made:

"Thanks to the €500 gift voucher given to us by your wonderful newsletter initiative we were able to buy a heavy duty Singer sewing machine, three industrial clothes rails, get professional signs made, and buy lots of hangers. We have started up a little cottage industry in our school where by we have teamed up with the three local charity shops in Lucan to sell clothes in our school on their behalf.

While we hold these pop-up shops, other students across the school learn about fast fashion and sustainable shopping. It has been a great success.

We have now applied for a Social Entrepreneurs Ireland funding award to see if we could potentially roll this project out for TY students across Ireland.

It is with thanks to you for your initial support that we have been able to develop in this way."



9. Did You Know?

- A typical Irish person consumes 150 litres of fresh water each day in daily activities from showering and bathing to food preparation and washing clothes.
- A full bathtub requires about 300 litres of water, while taking a five-minute shower uses approximately 60 litres.
- Approximately 11,500 litres of water are needed to produce 1 pound of meat but only 95 litres of water are needed to produce 1 pound of wheat.
- Using a bucket of water to clean your car instead of the hose or car wash saves about 300L of water every time.

11. CareersPortal: Go 'Green' with Course Options for 2022

There are a Wide variety of courses now available for the environmentally conscious student.

Last November's COP26 Summit has once again shone a light on the serious problems surrounding our environment and the world we live in. Global warming and climate change are two of the most pressing issues facing society and significant changes need to be made. More and more of our younger population are becoming concerned about these issues and this environmentally conscious generation are looking to take action to help enforce their values and create meaningful change.

What is important to us, our <u>Value System</u>, is a fundamental part of who we are. Our values can help guide how we live our life and can influence a large number of things we do and don't do. For example, our mode of travel, how we heat and run our houses, what we wear, what we eat, the products we buy or don't buy and much more.

It stands to reason then, that choosing a career or course that fits in with our value system can be very important. For example, a young person who is passionate

about the environment may well have difficulty working in a career that has a large carbon footprint because it goes against their values. For the environmentally conscious students who are thinking of the next step in their educational journey, there are many options in both Further & Higher education that will allow them to uphold their values while studying a degree that matches their interests.

There are many opportunities to study a 'Green' course in sectors as diverse as <u>Geography & Ecology</u>, <u>Engineering</u> or <u>Construction</u>, <u>Agriculture or Forestry</u>, the <u>Ocean and Wildlife</u>. 12. Junk Kouture – Irish Final

The first live final of Junk Kouture since 2020, held on Thursday 5 May at the Bord Gáis Energy Theatre, saw Ireland's up-and-coming eco-conscious creators and fashion designers showcase sixty haute-couture designs made from 100% recycled materials created and modelled by talented post-primary students.

Nine creations by young designers aged 13 -18 years from around the country were chosen by the Junk Kouture judges Louis Walsh, Roz Purcell, Soulé and Stephen McLaughlin to represent Ireland at the first ever Junk Kouture World Final in Abu Dhabi later this year. One more design will be chosen from the Dublin City finalists who didn't make it into the top nine as there is still a RTÉ Wildcard spot still up for grabs; the tenth design to represent Ireland at the World Final will then be announced live on RTÉ 2FM's Tracy Clifford Show in June.

Tune in to watch the broadcast of the Junk Kouture Powered by RTÉ Dublin City Final Highlights show on RTÉ2 and RTÉ Player on Thursday 19 May at 7pm, and then head to rte.ie/junkkouture to discover which five designs have been chosen by the Junk Kouture Powered by RTÉ judges to compete for the coveted RTÉ Wildcard place at the World Final. A public vote will open immediately after the broadcast on 19 May for the audience at home to determine their favourite.

The final 10 Irish designs will be up against 50 other designs - 10 from each of Junk Kouture's other city finals in five new territories: London, Paris, Milan, New York and Abu Dhabi. At the World Final, there will be six individual City Designer Awards for each location plus the first ever Junk Kouture World Designer of the Year! Other prizes include the Glamour Award, Wearable Art Award, Innovation Award and a Performance Award.

Junk Kouture is powered by RTÉ. The Creative Ireland Programme continues to support Junk Kouture across several areas developing its online education resources to ensure that students and educators alike can avail of educational material around Junk Kouture's three areas of focus: creativity, sustainability and entrepreneurship. Programmes driven by the support of Creative Ireland will help educators encourage young people to become micro-influencers for change through creativity and circularity.



13. Europe Day 2022

Europe Day is held each year on 9 May and celebrates peace and unity in Europe. The date marks the anniversary of the historic 'Schuman declaration' that set out his idea for a new form of political cooperation in Europe. Schuman's proposal is considered to be the beginning of what is now the European Union. Europe Day is a day on which EU institutions organise various events that allow citizens to see how decisions impacting their day-to-day lives are made. It connects the local and the European, presents cultural solutions to European challenges, making our continent more inclusive, more democratic, more culturally aware, and a better place to live. Europe can and must be a Europe of peace and social and economic justice.

This year an <u>eZine</u> which outlined some of the activities and ideas for celebrating Europe Day was created by the Department of Education in conjunction and its associate bodies. 14. DECC Update – NIP for the SDGs and National Stakeholder Forum

Launch of second round of consultation on the draft National Implementation

Plan for the Sustainable Development Goals and re-launch of the National Stakeholder Forum

The Department of Environment, Climate and Communications will be shortly launching the second round of consultation on the draft of Ireland's second National Implementation Plan for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The draft Implementation Plan aims to build on the structures and mechanisms developed as part of Ireland's <u>first National Implementation Plan</u> and to develop and integrate additional approaches in areas identified through review and consultation as requiring additional action.

An initial consultation process was held last summer and reached over 5,000 individuals. The feedback provided as part of the 2021 SDG consultation process was used to directly inform the priorities and actions developed as part of this new draft Implementation Plan.

A second round of consultation will be launched this month and will run for a four-week period. This will facilitate a final round of feedback on the draft Plan and form the basis for discussion at the relaunch of the SDG National Stakeholder Forum.

15. Circular Economy News

The Irish Government has published its landmark Circular Economy Bill, which is now making its way through the Oireachtas. As it currently stands, the bill will provide a statutory basis for the government's circular economy strategy and the EPA's circular economy programme, establish a Circular Economy Fund, and introduce bans or levies on single-use cups, containers and packaging. Importantly, it will also support the introduction of targets for reused and repaired products, one of the first of its kind in the EU, as well as setting the basis for sectoral targets around consumption and the use of re-usable products and materials.

Minister Ryan opened the first National Climate Stakeholder Forum this month, focussing on accelerating our national climate action priorities in a fair and effective way. This first forum focussed on key breakout sessions including offshore renewables, retrofitting, sustainable mobility and engagement, communications, and climate literacy.

The Irish Government has set its ambitions on reducing food waste by 50% by 2030 in the country with the National Food Waste Prevention Roadmap. The DECC drafted this roadmap for public consultation which closed on Monday, 28 March, and fruitful conversation around the topic ensued. The Rediscovery Centre hosted its 'Circular Economy Conversations: Fighting Food Waste Workshop' on 15 March to help stakeholders formulate submissions for the public consultation. Participants engaged in breakout room discussions around the topic and heard from experts from the EPA, the DECC, and those from the food industry discuss the importance of food waste prevention.

Held in Croke Park at the start of March, the Irish Waste Management Association and Chartered Institute of Waste Management Conference highlighted the need for Irish resource sovereignty in light of soaring inflation and a realignment of European resource priorities. In a conference that was dominated by the Russian invasion of the Ukraine, the event highlighted the necessity of a circular economy. As Philip

Nugent stated, "Never has there been a greater need for better resource efficiency. We must accelerate the transition to a circular economy now."

A new research pilot scheme entitled 'Donate, Don't Waste' for the collection of unwanted clothes and home textiles was launched this month in Charleville, Cork. The project is being delivered by Community Resources Network Ireland (CRNI) and is funded by the EPA under the Green Enterprise programme. Charleville is one of three locations for the new scheme which will gauge the attitudes and behaviours around unwanted clothing and home textiles, share information on where, when and what to donate, and make donations easier through drop points and door-to-door collections.

16. CEDEFOP – Employment Opportunities and the Green Transition

The transition to a green – and more digital – economy and society will soon upend the job market and create new skill needs across sectors and occupations. Europe will therefore need to invest in upskilling and reskilling its workforce.

In this context, vocational education and training (VET) will play an eminent role. Apprenticeship, being closely tied to the labour market, can swiftly adapt, alleviating short-term bottlenecks and ensuring long-term worker employability.

The European Centre for the Development of Vocational Training (CEDEFOP) has a now published the briefing note An Ally in the Green Transition on how vocational education training can provide the skills required to drive the green transition, related employment opportunities, and apprenticeships. 17. OECD - International Women's Day

International Women's Day on 8 March 2022 focused on the vital link between gender and climate change.

New data increasingly show that the negative impacts of global warming and environmental degradation especially affect women and girls.

At the same time, data also shows that women and girls are more aware of environmental issues, more likely to be environmentally motivated, and represent key actors in accelerating action and bringing about real change.

Environmental degradation affects women more than men - but how? The OECD's Ingrid Barnsley explores how women's behaviours differ and what this means for policy.

Did you know?

Women in parliament reached 31.6% in 2021.

Women in Politics

The share of women in the national lower or single houses of parliament (or equivalent) in OECD countries stood at 31.6% at the end of 2021. While it has increased from 20.1% in 2002, it falls short of equal representation in national legislatures.

How this figure has evolved over time also <u>differs markedly by country</u>. In Japan, the share of women parliamentarians has remained low, rising only slightly between 2002 and 2021 from 7.3% to 9.9%; in Sweden, it has remained high, but also rising slightly from 45.0% to 47.0%; Mexico, on the other hand, has seen sharp increase, from 16.0% to 48.2%.

<u>Women in government</u> follows a similar (but not identical) pattern. In Sweden, 52.4% of government ministers in 2005 were women, compared to 57.1% in 2021; in France, they were 17.6% and 50.0%, respectively. Across the OECD as a whole, it now stands at 34.0%.

What's the link between tax and the gender pay gap?

Women earn lower hourly wages than men, but how governments design tax policies con widen the pay gap further. Breaking the bias in tax can promote gender equality.

18. Young Social Innovators Gen Z Index 2022

The second report of the YSI / Amárach Gen Z Index 2022 has just been released and focuses on young people's attitudes to climate change and the environment. The report shares findings from a recent survey of 1,090 Generation Z respondents living in Ireland and reveals the impact of climate change concerns on Gen Z's mental health.

A Generation Disillusioned

Climate change is the #1 future concern for 78% of young people and the vast

majority (88%) are not confident that we are doing enough today to tackle the issue.

Nearly 9 in 10 young people believe the government is not doing enough to address the climate crisis and 4 in 5 believe that companies are also not doing enough.

Over half of young people believe that Ireland won't hit its key climate goals within the next 20 years.

Ready to Respond (mostly)

Gen Zs are already or willing to take many actions to help mitigate climate change and protect the environment. Recycling, reducing food waste, limiting the purchase of plastic wrapped food, using public transport and buying second hand clothes are the most commonly reported ways in which Gen Z are willing to act.

While Gen Z is very cognisant of the sacrifices and behaviour change required to improve our environmental outlook, there are some sacrifices that might be a step too far for them such as limiting overseas travel, eating less meat and showering less often to reduce water consumption

19. Launch of the Atlantic Technological University

Reimagining the Atlantic Technological University as a Climate Action University for the West and North-West Region.

The Atlantic Technological University (ATU) was officially launched on 1 April 2022.

The amalgamation of the Galway-Mayo Institute of Technology, Institute of Technology Sligo and Letterkenny Institute of Technology provides a unique opportunity to reimagine the role of higher education in the context of sustainability, climate action and the circular economy both locally and globally. To signify the importance of sustainability as a key strategic aim of the new university, the ATU hosted a 'Transitioning towards a Climate Action University' launch event on 6 April 2022, where opportunities related to teaching, learning, campus operations and community engagement were explored.

ATU is committed to becoming a leader in education for sustainability, community climate action, and transdisciplinary research and innovation for the circular economy. The Galway-Mayo Centre for Sustainability was launched in September 2021, with the aim of embedding sustainability and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as core guiding principles across all university activities with a particular focus on curriculum, campus management and operations, community engagement, collaborative research, and culture as key strategic pillars. This approach aims to nurture and build on the significant grassroots activities underway across all campuses. For example, in October 2021, the ATU Sligo campus officially launched their sustainability strategy, which committed to including sustainability in all decision-making across the university. The following three exciting projects are currently underway in ATU:

- The ATU is leading the development of a National Digital Badge on 'Introducing Education for Sustainability' in collaboration with DCU, UCC and TU Dublin. This project is funded by the National Forum for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning in Higher Education and is due to commence in October 2022.
- The ATU is developing a cross-disciplinary Special Purpose Award in the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) comprising four 'stackable' self-paced modules on Partnership, People, Planet and Prosperity that students can take in addition to their primary course of study. This initiative is part of the Higher Ed 4.0 project, which is funded under the Human Capital Initiative (HCI).

• ATU are collaborating with UCC, Maynooth University and multiple industry partners on the Sustainable Futures project, which is focused on climate action, environmental sustainability, and achieving net zero in industry and enterprise. In addition, ATU has transitioned their Level 9 10-credit module on 'Education for Sustainability' into an online format to facilitate ongoing continuing professional development in this area for all staff.



20. SEAI Schools 'Finding your Climate Superpower' Event

SEAI's 'Finding your Climate Superpower' event at the Irish Science Teachers Association Annual Conference on 8 April focused on leading and inspiring for change in schools

Dr. Tara Shine keynote speaker highlighted the importance of education in fostering future sustainability leaders:

"Education is crucial to promoting climate action. Learning is key to finding solutions and creating a more sustainable world. If you care about something and use whatever platform you have to show that you care, in your case as teachers of students, that is your superpower. Educators are invaluable in motivating students and can give them knowledge about the climate crisis so they can make choices and take climate action. This knowledge trickles not just to the young people in the classroom but to their homes and family networks."

Speakers at the event all reiterated that education is crucial to promoting climate action. Learning is key to finding solutions and creating a more sustainable world. Educators are invaluable in motivating students and can give them the knowledge

about the climate crisis so they can make choices and take climate action. This knowledge impacts not just on the young people in the classroom but also on their homes and family networks.

Margie McCarthy, Director of Research and Policy Insight at the SEAI who hosted the event said:

"We have a range of supports available to help teachers bring climate action into the classroom in an inquiry based, immersive and curriculum aligned way. The transition to climate-neutrality will require changes across our society, with schools included within the target of 51% reduction in greenhouse gases by 2030 in the Governments Climate Action Plan 2021. SEAI is playing a key role in supporting schools to deliver on this. We have a range of supports for energy use in schools, and how to champion improvements there. Delivering on this national climate ambition is the responsibility of everyone in society."

Education is a key element of the Government Climate Action Plan 2021. Improving climate literacy will enhance our capacity to make the necessary changes we will have to make in our daily lives. It will enable us to engage with climate action at a local level and to participate at national level in the co-design of policy. This can best be achieved through the promotion of evidence-based communications and through the national education system.

23. Climate Smart - New Transition Unit for Climate Adaptation

The Climate Smart project, run by Trinity College Dublin's department of geography,

has developed a new transition year unit to educate young people about climate adaptation in Ireland.

The unit consists of six interactive workshops which will teach pupils about:

- The science of climate change, and the policies developed to combat it
- The recent history and future of flooding in Ireland
- Sensing, monitoring, and predicting floods
- Visualising floods and flood-related damage
- Building from grey infrastructure to nature-based solutions to help us adapt
- How we can adapt as a society.

When they've completed the workshops, pupils will be ready to test their knowledge by playing the iAdapt Game, an interactive map-based game which can be played on computers, tablets, and even phones. The game puts you in charge of a flood-threatened Dublin in the year 2045: you must use what you've learned during the workshops to effectively plan, consult on, and implement Dublin's flood defences, striking a balance between keeping people safe, and keeping voters happy.

Each workshop is broken down into short videos which can be watched as a class or by individual pupils, followed by multiple-choice quizzes to test participants' knowledge. A full suite of accompanying materials will be available to you in order to tailor your teaching: watch the videos and use them as the basis of in-class discussion, or allow students to complete the workshops as self- directed learning while you monitor their progress on the climate smart platform.

24. JCT - STE(A)M in Action in School

On 28 April, schools from across the country gathered in Ballinasloe to reflect on, share and celebrate the learning which took place in schools as they participated in the Junior Cycle for Teacher's initiative, **STE(A)M in Action in School**.

Through this initiative, teachers from different subject areas in each of the participating schools collaborated to support students to make connections across subjects.

Students were then supported to use this learning to take action on a societal issue which was of concern to them, thereby connecting classroom learning to the real world. Issues explored through engagement with the Junior Cycle subject specifications included biodiversity, energy production, energy usage, food supply, climate action, fast fashion and water.

These issues provided a context for teachers and students to engage with learning outcomes across a wide range of Junior Cycle subjects. These included Science, Mathematics, Home Economics, Geography, Visual Art, Applied Technology, Engineering, Technical Graphics, Business Studies, English, Physical Education and Media Studies. This resulted in the integration of Education for Sustainable development (ESD) into the Junior Cycle curriculum.

The young people showed a deep understanding of the societal issues and demonstrated that they had developed skills and values which saw them take actions aimed at a more sustainable future.

While each school sent a small representative group to the event, over 1500 students and 60 teachers across 17 schools participated in the initiative this year.

25. Global Action Plan - Launch of New Erasmus+ Project

Global Action Plan (GAP) Ireland are pleased to announce the launch of 'Just Action: Teachers and students towards a sustainable transition', an Erasmus+ project. Just Action will build primary and post-primary teachers' capacity to use global citizenship education (GCE) to support their students in action for climate justice. Between 2022 and 2024, this project will develop educational resources, teacher CPD, and an online portal. The project will also build connections between teachers and schools in partner countries of Italy, Norway, and Spain.

Research conducted as part of the application process indicated that teachers in Ireland see the value of GCE to fostering resilient, creative student who are motivated to take action on climate justice. At the same time, teachers feel undersupported to use GCE and appropriate methodologies and are keen to increase their skills. Just Action aims to bridge this gap, adopting a design-thinking approach

to developing resources and teacher training to ensure our outputs are effective, useful, and accessible.

As part of this process, the Just Action team will consult widely with stakeholders throughout 2022 as GAP develop project outputs, and will also work closely with selected teachers to pilot the training and resources. These teachers will pilot project resources in their classrooms from September 2022, and join GAP for a pilot training session in Norway in early 2023.

26. Research Grants for Projects in Health and Climate

On 10 May Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, Simon Harris TD, has announced 76 grants valued at €53.7 million to support frontiers research across ten Higher Education Institutions through Science Foundation Ireland (SFI).

The research supported will investigate areas such as childhood ADHD, future coastal sea levels, new generation batteries, antiviral drugs to treat Covid-19 infections, safety critical software, the link between obesity and cancer and the future proofing of crops to with stand flooding.

In line with SFI's gender strategy, the programme seeks to provide opportunities to address gender imbalance and to provide support for investigators returning to research after a period of leave. 42% of the research grants supported will be led by female researchers and 32% by emerging investigators early in their research careers

The programme is run in collaboration with Geological Survey Ireland and the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI) who are co-funding a number of the grants.

The full list of awards and projects supported can be found here.

The SFI Frontiers for the Future programme comprise two funding streams:

- Projects: 58 high-risk, high-reward research projects will receive approx.
 €32.3m to facilitate highly innovative and novel approaches to research.
- Awards: 18 larger scale innovative, collaborative excellent research programmes that have the potential to deliver economic and societal impact will receive approx. €21.4m in funding.

The SFI Frontiers for the Future Programme supports the development of world class research capability and human capital in areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) that demonstrably support and underpin enterprise competitiveness and societal development in Ireland.

Working across ten Higher Education Institutes, 216 research positions will be funded including 93 Postdoctoral scientists, 105 PhD students and 18 Research Assistants/others across a variety of different areas.

46 industrial collaborators are engaging in the research programmes.

The research will be undertaken in the following Higher Education Institutions: RCSI University of Medicine and Health Sciences, University College Dublin, Maynooth University, Trinity College Dublin, University of Limerick, National University of

Ireland, Galway, University College Cork, Technological University Dublin, Tyndall National Institute and Dublin City University.
