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# 1. ESD to 2030 – Funding Call for Schools

The Department is now inviting recognised primary and post-primary schools to apply for ESD to 2030 funding for projects and programmes that support the implementation of ESD to 2030. Further details and the application form are available <u>here</u>. The closing date for receipt of applications is midnight on Friday 6 October 2023. Successful schools will be notified directly before the end of October and details of grantees will be published on the ESD to 2030 webpage.

In 2022, Kinsale Community School was one of the schools to receive ESD to 2030 funding which was used to purchase and install a MyGug biodigester to deal with the problem of food waste at the school. Kinsale Community School told us that when food breaks down in landfill it emits methane gas - a more potent greenhouse gas than  $CO_2$  - into the atmosphere. The MyGug on the other hand, converts food waste using a natural process called anaerobic digestion, turning it into a useable form of methane and a liquid fertiliser, thus eliminating the need to send food waste to landfill. The gas is pumped into one of the school's home economics rooms where it is used for cooking, and the liquid fertiliser will be used as a plant/soil feed in the school's greenhouse.

The MyGug has been designed and produced by Kieran Coffey in Co. Cork and comes in different sizes. In order to choose the right sized digester, the school's TY 'Waste Watchers' team weighed the food waste from the canteen over a period of a week to determine the quantity produced. Based on this evidence the appropriate size was selected, which is the 'Mini' MyGug which converts up to 5.5kg of food waste per day. Unlike a composter, it doesn't take garden waste, but most forms of raw and cooked food. It uses a macerator to reduce the food waste to smaller 'digestible' pieces, so large solid items such as heavy bones and avocado stones cannot be inserted.

The MyGug will be managed and operated by members of the KCS Staff Sustainability Team and the Green Schools committee.

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# 2. ESD to 2030 – Organisation Funding Grantees

A funding call for organisations and projects supporting the implementation of ESD to 2030 in schools was made in the May ESD Newsletter and funding of just over €267,000 has now been awarded. 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# 3. Sustainability Toolkit for Schools

Under the Climate Action Plan, all public sector bodies are required to comply with a Public Sector Climate Action Mandate, other than some specified organisations including schools for which a separate mandate would apply.

The School Sector - Climate Action Mandate was published on 14 March 2023

One of the objectives in the Mandate is that schools would adopt a **Sustainability Policy Statement**. A working group was established by the Department to develop templates and guidelines to support schools in adopting their statement. These documents are now available on the ESD to 2030 webpage including:

- A self-assessment audit to help schools identify their strengths and weaknesses in terms of Sustainable Development
- A Sustainability Guidelines document
- A Sustainability Policy Statement template

We hope these documents will assist schools in drafting their Sustainability Policy Statements and that schools will publish the statement on their websites. The toolkit is available <u>here</u>.

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## 4. Teacher CPD for ESD

In March 2023, the Department commissioned a mapping exercise in order to identify the available ESD related CPD that is available for primary and post-primary teachers. The inventory of CPD is now available on the ESD to 2030 webpage <u>here</u>. The list will be updated regularly as new CPD opportunities become available.

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## **5. SDG Posters for Schools**

## 6. ESD Around the Country – Galway and Kerry

### a. ESD News from Galway

#### Galway's Pilot City Activity: Net Zero Pilot

Improving energy efficiency in buildings is a top priority for Galway on the road to net zero and the focus of the City's Net Zero Pilot activities. The City Council currently focuses on retrofitting public buildings and social housing, but the decarbonisation of private buildings remains a major challenge. The goal of the pilot activities is to address systemic barriers across the entire retrofitting value chain in Galway, tackling demand and supply challenges. The pilot activities will do so by engaging citizens, energy cooperatives, local education and training bodies, city, regional and national government officials, and research institutes in novel ways to accelerate the retrofitting process and increase the energy efficiency of homes in Galway.

There is a national scheme to facilitate 500,000 retrofits by 2030 but the scheme has thus far fallen well short of its target. Ireland's ambitious retrofitting goals are being held back by a lack of awareness, insufficient contractors, significant upfront costs and an overly bureaucratic process. Galway will pilot activities to address these and showcase how local authorities can overcome challenges to reaching climate and retrofitting goals. The main activities will involve increasing awareness of retrofitting programmes and benefits through community outreach, providing support to homeowners across the entire retrofitting timeline, and offering training courses and incentive schemes to build a highly skilled workforce that can meet the retrofit demand in Galway. Additionally, administrative and policy barriers to retrofitting will be addressed by introducing a Quadruple Helix Steering Group with a mandate to introduce reforms.

Galway City Council owns a social housing stock of approximately 3,000 houses/apartments and has been steadily improving the building fabric of the houses. In 2022, University of Galway partnered with Galway City Council to complete comprehensive monitoring programme of energy consumption and indoor environmental conditions of homes before and after retrofit through SEAI-funded HEAT-CHECK project.

Galway City Council has also undertaken significant activities to identify suitable districts in the city for decarbonisation pilot activities, "Decarbonisation Zones." As such, a detailed assessment for the decarbonisation potential of the city's neighbourhoods was undertaken. The Built Environment was a major theme in this assessment and data including Building Energy Ratings of residential buildings was included.

#### University of Galway ranked 34th in the world for Sustainability

The Impact Rankings place University of Galway number 1 among Irish universities for addressing UN Sustainable Development Goals

- University of Galway has been named the number one university in Ireland for sustainable development for a second year in a row.

- The accolade has been awarded by The Impact rankings in recognition of University of Galway's progress in responding to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

- University of Galway has increased its ranking in the world's top 50 universities for sustainable development – jumping more than 10 places to 34th

- The Impact report cements University of Galway's position as number one in Ireland for sustainable development

- University of Galway recognised globally for significant contribution to progress on 11 of the 17 UN SDGs

- World ranking of number 5 for Responsible Consumption and Production (SDG 12)

- University of Galway ranked top 50 for 7 of the 17 SDGs

According to The Impact, the University is top 50 in seven areas and retained the top 10 rank in one area:

Ranked 5th in the world for SDG 12: Responsible Consumption and Production (same as 2022)

Ranked 21st for SDG 14: Life Below Water, up 10 places

Ranked 23rd for SDG 7: Affordable & Clean Energy, up from 75th

Ranked 43rd for SDG 3: Good Health & Wellbeing, up from 51st

Ranked 44th for SDG 11: Sustainable Cities and Communities

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# b. Sustainable Action at Coláiste na Sceilge, Cahersiveen, Kerry

Muinín Catalyst Sustainable STEAM (MCSS) is a cross-curricular programme with a range of Transition Year Units, that blend the skills and competencies from the arts into the STEM subjects, with a focus on sustainable action. Muinín Catalyst Solutions have been working with Transition Year learners for the past three years in Coláiste na Sceilge, Cahersiveen, to design and develop a <u>1km Health and Wellbeing Trail</u>.

Incorporating geography and enterprise, learners have been using <u>circular design thinking</u> to develop the overall trail layout and different poise points along it. This ongoing sustainability project develops 21st century skills and encourages learners to consider every aspect of the sustainable design process. To encourage problem-solving, the learners have been working with a specific pause point, a Sustainable Development Goal to incorporate into it, specific users to design for, and a challenge to overcome. These challenges included low to no

budget, designing points which do not require planning permission, using only reused and recycled materials, etc. Last year's TY learners presented their ideas to Kerry ETB, the school board, and peers.

Engaging in this project has given the learners the opportunity to work autonomously, to develop 21st century skills such as creativity and critical thinking, and to develop enterprise skills.

The Health and Wellbeing Trail is a continuing TY project in the school, as more pause points are developed alongside their teachers using this sustainable, circular design thinking approach.

This project is co-funded by the Department of Education and SFI under the Discovery Programme between 2022-2024.

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## 7. School Updates

### a. ESD at Celbridge Community School

"This year in CCS, we started a new horticulture short course. Once the winter had passed, we began learning about spring planting. We planted over 200 spring flowering bulbs around the school, especially flowers which would be good for early emerging bee.

The TY Horticulture Class created six large flower planters which were planted with beeloving flowers and herbs later in the spring. These are placed at the front of the school, and we have spotted native bumble bees enjoying the nectar from the flower. Also, this year ECO-UNESCO held a workshop under our World Wise Global School sustainable food production and waste goals.

The workshop took place during 'May Day for Sustainability' on Tuesday 9 May and the school is now signed up for the @Take 1 national programme for promoting sustainability in schools.

We were busy every week planting different vegetables in our expanding garden. This year we hope to harvest potato, peas, strawberries and more. Working with the local Doonbeg Community Farm and National Tree Council we prepared a new mini-forest area at the back of the school and mulched it with four tonnes of compost.

Later in the autumn the horticulture classes will plant over 100 native Irish saplings, oak, birch, hawthorn and more. We are hoping to create a circular forest as an area for wellbeing and mindfulness."

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
## b. SDGs at St. Aloysius School in Cork

In December 2022, Rang Lorcán, St Aloysius School, Sharman, Crawford Street Cork, decided to run a soccer competition involving the whole school as their CAR for CSPE. This was to highlight 1) exploitation of people from developing countries in sporting events around the world, 2) the work of Irish Aid and 3) the relevant SDG's.

To enter the 'St Als Protest Cup' each class had to pick a country from the developing economies supported by Irish Aid and design a poster with information on how Irish Aid supports their chosen country. The posters were displayed in the foyer along with match times and references to SDGs.

The goals highlighted were Goal 8: Decent Work and Economic Growth, Goal 10: Reduced Inequality, Goal 16: Peace and Justice Strong Institutions. The tournament was run over a two-week period on our Astro pitch and each match was six minutes long (with some penalty shootouts). This CAR developed the skills of literacy, numeracy, time management, organisation, teamwork, sports skills and overall wellness which was displayed in interest, excitement and fun.

It was a great whole school event, of which the staff and students said, "We have a better insight and understanding of inequality in our world and the aid that helps to reduce these inequalities so everyone in the future can hopefully live in a more equal and fair society."

#### Congratulations!

"At Stepaside Educate Together Secondary School we are working towards creating an environment that is rich in Biodiversity around our school. We believe by that using the school grounds to support and attract nature we can create a space that can inspire, educate, and raise environmental awareness in our students.

Since moving to this site in 2020 we have developed the grounds with nature in mind: to date, we have planted two pocket forests of native trees and each year we are expanding these by planting additional native trees. We have reduced our mowing to allow Irish wildflowers to thrive as depicted in our chosen photograph, we have planted two dedicated wildflower areas. Each autumn students plant pollinator-friendly spring bulbs, we built and planted pollinator flower beds and we are growing our own fruit and Vegetables in our polytunnel.

We have promoted nature education by conducting wildflower, insect, and tree surveys. We have brought in a range of speakers who are masters in their field including an ecologist an organic farmer, and a nature photographer, and we even had a dedicated Bio-diversity day. We are working on engaging more with the community by creating a parents' garden."

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## b. UCD – Master's Pathway in Foundations of Sustainable Development

The Master's Pathway is a partnership between the SDG Academy and University College Dublin (UCD), one of Europe's leading universities, to give learners a flexible, accredited pathway to further education in the field of sustainable development. Students who complete the Master's Pathway on edX will be eligible to receive 10 credits towards <u>UCD's online</u>

<u>Professional Diploma in Foundations of Sustainable Development</u>.\* Once they complete the Diploma, students can continue into <u>UCD's Master's of Science (MSc.) in Sustainable</u> <u>Development</u> – offsetting those academic credits and providing a pathway for learners with non-traditional academic backgrounds.

Delve into the foundations of sustainable development and the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) with world-renowned economist Jeffrey Sachs, environmental scientist Johan Rockström (one of TIME magazine's 100 most influential people of 2023), and other global leaders in the field. For this graduate certificate, you will learn the tenets of sustainable development and how our societies can develop within the planet's boundaries to prevent biodiversity loss, deforestation, desertification, and environmental degradation.

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## c. Take 1 Programme - Post-Primary Pilot



**Education for Sustainable Development in Post-Primary Schools** 

The Take 1 Programme completed its first pilot phase of training for post-primary schools outside of the education and training board (ETB) sector, during the second and third terms of the 2022/23 academic year. Programme director, Valerie Lewis met with principals, deputy principals as well as a variety of teachers and support staff from over 40 post-primary schools around the country, as they embarked on their journey to enhance their engagement with Education for Sustainable Development (ESD). Training took place using a blended approach of both online and in-person engagement. Participating schools showcased their learning by highlighting their activities as part of May Day for Sustainability 2023. This year's challenge encouraged schools to create a 'Metre of Meadow' on their grounds, aimed at enhancing local biodiversity and supporting targets aligned to SDG 15 – Life on Land.

The Take 1 Programme is funded by the Department of Education as part of ESD to 2030, Ireland's second National Strategy on Education for Sustainable Development, with its work aligned to Priority 2 – Transforming Learning Environments. To date 231 unique postprimary schools have participated in Take 1 Programme training representing over 30% of second-level schools in the country. Training will be offered again in the coming academic year. It is hoped to grow and enhance ESD knowledge, participation and transformation as part of this inclusive sustainability programme.

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### i. Bright Start Profile Assessment Booklet for Junior Infants

This booklet is designed to assess the extent to which children are ready to thrive as they begin junior infants, and then to re-assess this readiness approximately six months later.

The hand-drawn artwork features native trees, flowers and creatures to encourage children to reconnect with nature, and in time to become more invested in caring for our natural but fragile world.

The tasks assess children's early numeracy and language skills, their ability to match images that are similar (but not identical), their cutting skills, their crayon control and their ability to draw a simple self-portrait. Children are provided with opportunities to match and count, but also to subitise, that is, to recognise the number of objects in a small set with the need to count them.

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The open-ended questions "what do you see?" and "what do you notice?" are designed to encourage children to look closely at the related autumn and spring images, and to begin to notice similarities and differences.

Taken together, children's performance on these tasks provides a useful indicator of their potential to flourish in the junior infant classroom.

## s. Oide – TY Project and SDGs in STEM

Oide plans to promote the Department's Education for Sustainable Development by working with schools to assist in transforming learning environments in the 2023/24 academic year by facilitating different projects and workshops and working to embed ESD in curricula and programmes.

The Oide Science team has planned to further develop the collaborative TY 'Climate Detectives Crossing STEM' project that was piloted in schools last year.

TY teachers (inter disciplinary) will be supported to build their own capacity to identify climate related issues in line with adjustments to '*Looking at Our School 2022: A Quality Framework for Post-Primary, Schools*' and develop research questions with their students around the theme of Climate Change / Action in their local area. They will:

- follow the scientific method to investigate their question
- receive feedback from scientists / engineers working in the field
- include a design and make solution to their problem
- present their findings at a national event

This is a collaboration between Oide, SFI and ESERO.

Oide will also facilitate regional evening professional learning events for teachers promoting Sustainable Development Goals in STEM Education. This workshop will introduce teachers to new high-quality learning and teaching resources which focus on the United Nations' sustainable development goals and how these can be enacted through engagement with STEM. These resources have been developed by Science on Stage Europe as a collaboration between teachers from across a number of European countries and will be available to teachers online through the 'Scoilnet' portal. Through the workshop, teachers will explore:

- the UN's 17 sustainable development goals and their importance in education
- the suite of lessons and associated resources which promote students as active and responsible citizens through STEM
- participation by schools in the Future League STEM competition

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## **10. HEI Sector updates**

### a. MIC Thurles links with Teacher Educators in Malawi

MIC Thurles, with the support of their Centre for Leadership and Inclusive Studies (CLISTE), the

Irish Embassy in Malawi and the Malawi Ministry of Education, currently sponsor seven teacher education lecturers from Malawi to participate in MIC Thurles' Postgrad in Middle Leadership and Mentoring, accessing the programme on-line. The Teacher Education lecturers work in the teacher education sector in Malawi preparing teachers at primary and post-primary. Through Erasmus funding the students plan to travel to Ireland in 2023/24.

In August 2023, representatives from MIC Thurles visited Malawi and met with their students in the company of Malawi Minister of Education, the Hon Madalitso Wirima Kambauwa MP. Currently, the Ministry is drafting a Memorandum of Understanding to explore how MIC might support teacher educators across the 11 Teacher Training Colleges in Malawi.

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### b. VIBE – UCD Innovation Academy and the National University of Vietnam Collaboration Nurturing Sustainable Innovations for a Brighter Future

The collaboration between the UCD Innovation Academy (IA) and The National University of Vietnam, Hanoi (VNU) under the DFA Irish Aid 'Vietnam Ireland Bilateral Education Exchange (VIBE)' Programme has been ongoing since 2017.

With the partnership now in phase 3 of the project, this April, the IA introduced the theme of Sustainability to the VIBE community by delivering a *Design Thinking for Sustainability* module at VNU Hanoi. More recently, this August, 15 VNU Hanoi academics arrived at the IA for a two-week programme focused on Sustainability with a lens on eco-tourism. With the delivery of the *Innovation for Sustainability* module at UCD, the VIBE team focused on exploring the themes of fast fashion, clean water and waste management, concluding with a question for the following week ahead of their empathy phase – 'How might we develop a sustainable eco-tourism idea for Vietnam'?

To assist the VIBE team in developing their ideas, week two involved visiting some of Ireland's best eco-tourism destinations, including one of Ireland's most sustainable craft beer

brewing companies and one of Ireland's only fully Carbon Neutral hotels. Visiting nine different sites gave the VIBE team a real sense of what could be achieved in Vietnam.

The two-week programme concluded with three VIBE teams presenting their ideas in a concept pitch format. They offered ground-breaking prototype ideas to return to Vietnam to develop further with their faculty and students.

Since the partnership in 2017, we have also welcomed VNU academics on our UCD Professional Certificate/Diploma in Creativity & Innovation for Education, and we eagerly look forward to continuing this collaboration to collectively contribute to building a better tomorrow.



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# c. ESD-Net 2030 Interactive Learning Webinars on ESD Pedagogy

The webinars organised by UNESCO to promote knowledge sharing, collaboration and mutual learning are available to watch <u>here</u>. The <u>March series</u> included a session facilitated by the International Association of Universities on Higher Education and ESD – 'Taking a transdisciplinary approach to teaching based on SDG 4 and ESD at universities'.

## d. NTFL - UN Award

National Forum for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning named as UNESCO Laureate in recognition of work on open educational resources and practices via the National Resource Hub.

Ireland's National Forum for the Enhancement of Teaching and Learning in Higher Education has been announced as a Laureate of the esteemed <u>UNESCO King Hamad Bin</u> <u>Isa Al-Khalifa Prize for the Use of ICT in Education on 7<sup>th</sup> June 2023.</u> The Laureate will receive US\$25,000 for its work in making public digital learning platforms and digital content universally accessible, developing digital competencies for all teachers and learners, and promoting universal connectivity in education. This milestone highlights the initiative's alignment with education for sustainable development objectives in Ireland and creation of active contributors to a more sustainable and inclusive future.

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## e. TU Dublin - Sustainability Education Toolkit

TU Dublin's Strategic Intent 2030 sets out that all programmes will have sustainability learning outcomes. This toolkit, launched in June, is designed to provide users with a choice of educational resources relevant to sustainable development, enabling academic staff to embed sustainability within the curricula. <u>The Sustainability Education Toolkit</u> is an ever-evolving resource, which will be updated as newer, more relevant, or effective resources become available.

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## f. Gap to Target Tool - SEAI



All public bodies, including schools, must achieve a 51% reduction in energy-related greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions and a 50% improvement in energy efficiency by 2030. It is up to each individual organisation to determine how the targets can be best achieved and they must report their energy performance annually. In 2022, 345 public bodies including ETBs and 2,898 standalone schools reported using the SEAI Monitoring and Reporting (M&R) system.

The SEAI Monitoring and Reporting (M&R) system offers several benefits to your organisation:

- Enables your organisation to fulfil your legal obligations with respect to reporting
- Provides a summary of your organisation's overall energy performance
- Access to your organisation's electricity and natural gas consumption data
- Allows comparison with the progress of other public bodies in achieving targets
- Showcases your achievements

It also helps organisations understand their energy consumption, target areas for improvement, identify opportunities, review progress, monitor and benchmark performance and validate savings.

The SEAI offer a range of supports including free training workshops, step-by-step videos and guides to help you complete your M&R report.

The academy offers a wide range of programmes available covering topics from Drones in Construction, Residential Energy Retrofit, Community Energy, BIM, and others. #### Mid-term evaluation report on the Human Capital Initiative (HCI) Pillar 3.

This report, launched at the <u>HCI Mid-Term Conference on 29 June 2023</u>, outlines the progress on innovations across teaching and learning, supported by access to technologies (both software and hardware), which are actively being piloted and deployed in learning environments nationally. #### UCD and MTU have published details of ESD initiatives funded through SATLE.

In autumn 2022, funding from the Strategic Alignment of Teaching and Learning Enhancement Fund (SATLE) was allocated to higher education institutions to drive teaching and learning innovation and enhancement across the higher education sector on specific themes. Learning enhancement projects span the full range of discipline areas and have engagement from students, staff and external partners. As part of the N-TUTORR project, Nursing students and staff from Ireland, the UK, China, and the USA recognised that climate change poses the greatest threat to global health and wellbeing. They discussed their role in reducing healthcare's contribution to our carbon footprint on a global scale. Now this global network of nurses is determined to progress this vital agenda of sustainability and climate action within their own spheres of influence. #### Green space project in Ballina achieves Ireland's first win in the New European Bauhaus Award in Brussels

The Ripple Project created a climate-friendly amenity in the Greenhills area of Ballina, Co. Mayo, which includes a haven for wildlife, a tree nursery for local oaks, heritage fruit trees, vegetable beds, pollinator-friendly planting, and a nature-based play area. The project was a collaborative effort involving experts from the University College Dublin Centre for Irish towns (CfIT), the Ballina Green Towns initiative, and the local residents. #### Call for citizen scientists in Dublin for 2-year water quality project

DCU have partnered with Earthwatch Europe, Dublin City Council, and the Local Authorities Water Programme (LAWPRO) on the 'Urban Citizen's 6.3.2' project, which aims to work with local communities to monitor Dublin's rivers and streams. The project, supported by the <u>Irish</u> <u>Research Council</u>, is currently recruiting members of the community from the Tolka, Dodder and Santry catchments, and the catchments of the Kill-o-the-Grange and Loughlinstown streams to monitor water quality (by measuring a number of plant nutrients) and biodiversity (macroinvertebrates – insects that live in the water), and will be running training days over the coming weeks. The Department of Education published the School Sector Technical Climate Action Roadmap 2023 to 2030 providing an overview of the school sector requirements and roadmap to 2030 and towards 2050 in the transition to net zero in our schools. It includes the strategic vision, outlines the high level initial trajectory for the school sector delivery of its energy efficiency and greenhouse gas emission reduction targets.

## c. CSO 2022 Census Summary Report

The recently published CSO 2022 Census Summary Report shows for the first time ever, a decrease in car usage for children being driven to school, with 55% of primary and 42% of post primary students being driven or driving to school. This is a decrease from 59.8% since the 2016 census.

The report also showed an increase in the number of students walking and cycling to school and college since 2016. In 2022, there were 88% more primary school pupils and 79% more post-primary students cycling to school than in 2016. The number of teenage girls cycling to school more than doubled in 2022 from 2016.

The Green-Schools Travel Programme works directly with schools promoting active and sustainable transport to school. When working on the Travel themes of the programme, schools are assigned a dedicated Travel Officer to work with their school identifying opportunities for, and promoting, walking, cycling, scooting, park 'n' stride, public transport use and carpooling on the journey to school.

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## **12. European Council News**



# a. Council Conclusions on Skills and Competences for the Green Transition

On 7 March, the Education, Youth, Culture and Sport Council gathered in Brussels. Education ministers approved conclusions on skills and competences for the green transition and held a policy debate on high-quality teachers as the cornerstone of a successful European Education Area.

The conclusions on skills and competences for the green transition relate to the European Council conclusions of 9 February 2023, when EU heads of state and government called for bolder and more ambitious actions to further develop the skills required for the green and digital transitions, through education, training, upskilling and reskilling.

The EU education ministers adopted the document to support the role of vocational and higher education in transferring the skills.

The newly approved document, dated 7 March, follows the European Council Conclusions of <u>9 February 2023</u>, in which the EU Heads of State and Government called for more ambitious action to further develop the skills needed for the **green and digital transition** through **education, training, upskilling and reskilling**. The document was adopted in the context of the European Year of Skills and reacts also to the Council Recommendation on Vocational Education and Training for Sustainable Competitiveness, Social Equity and Resilience, the European Strategy for Universities, the Council Recommendation on Learning for Environmental Sustainability and the European Competence Framework on Sustainability (GreenComp).

Sustainability competences include the knowledge, skills, and attitudes that learners of all ages need to live, work and act in a sustainable way. Green skills refer to the professional skills that are needed in all sectors and levels of the labour market to transition to green living, including the creation of new green jobs. They also refer to cross-cutting skills that enable critical and systems thinking, problem solving and innovation.

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## b. GreenComp Community of Practice – New Online Course

There is **a new online course** on futures literacy, <u>Futures Forward</u>, developed by the Commission and supporting Green Comp. It is hosted and promoted via <u>Ted-Ed</u> (the educational partner <u>Ted-X</u>). Inspired by <u>EarthSchool</u> (Ted-Ed), the goal is to help young people better prepare for their future, by teaching them about the future. Futures Forward is set-up around 5 futures literacy topics 1. Perception of time, 2. Futures mindset, 3. Multiple futures, 4. Investing in imaginations, 5. Taking action, and provides easily digestible videos and online lessons on key GreenComp competences such as systems thinking, futures literacy or critical thinking.

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# c. Teacher Education for the Green Transition and Sustainable Development

A recent EENEE report by Ingrid Mulà and the European Council's Working Group consultant Daniella Tilbury focuses on how do to ensure that teachers are sufficiently equipped to facilitate students' learning for sustainability. 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## 13. UN News



## a. Ireland's Voluntary National Review of the SDGs

In July 2023, at the UN's High Level Political Forum in New York, Ireland was among 39 countries to present its Voluntary National Review (VNR) of progress towards achieving the 17 Sustainable Development Goals.

Ireland's second VNR was developed in collaboration with multiple stakeholders through a stakeholder forum, online consultation and a youth consultation process. The focus of the VNR was "Building Back Better while Leaving No One Behind". It aimed to facilitate the sharing of experiences including successes, challenges and lessons learned, with a view to accelerating the implementation of Agenda 2030. Chapter 7.1 of the VNR focuses on Education.

The Irish VNR is the first to include a standalone Youth chapter and Irish UN Youth Delegates held a side event at the HLPF on meaningful inclusion of youth in the VNR process.

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## b. UN – SDG Progress Report 2023

The Sustainable Development Goals Report 2023: Special Edition provides a powerful call to action, presenting a candid assessment of the SDGs based on the latest data and

estimates. While highlighting the existing gaps and urging the world to redouble its efforts, the report also emphasizes the immense potential for success through strong political will and the utilization of available technologies, resources, and knowledge. Together, the global community can reignite progress towards achieving the SDGs and create a brighter future for all. According to the report, the impacts of the climate crisis, the war in Ukraine, a weak global economy, and the lingering effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have revealed weaknesses and hindered progress towards the Goals. The report further warns that while lack of progress is universal, it is the world's poorest and most vulnerable who are experiencing the worst effects of these unprecedented global challenges. It also points out areas that need urgent action to rescue the SDGs and deliver meaningful progress for people and the planet by 2030.

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## c. UNESCO – ESD Net Europe and North America Meeting

The Department of Education and the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science both attended UNESCO's First ESD Net (Europe and North America) meeting on 25 and 26 June. 22 member states were represented at the meeting.

UNESCO confirmed at the meeting that Ireland and Spain are the first two countries in the region with a completed Country Initiative. Other Member States in the region are in the process of developing their Country Initiative. ESD to 2030 is Ireland's Country Initiative and is now available on the UNESCO website: ESD for 2030 country initiatives | UNESCO

Ireland shared updates on progress on ESD to 2030 with the network including a presentation on embedding ESD competencies, content, attitudes and skills across the curriculum at all levels. Ireland's Youth representative on the UNECE Youth Platform also attended and lead a session on Youth Engagement and Empowerment. Ireland's National Youth Assembly on Climate was highlighted at this session as an example of good practice in the region.

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# d. UNECE to Create a Youth Task Force on Education for Sustainable Development

Young people are the cohort of the population most impacted by decisions and actions on <u>Education for Sustainable Development</u> (ESD) in Ireland and throughout the world. Ministers at the recent <u>9th Environment for Europe Conference</u> highlighted a need for ESD to empower all learners with the knowledge, skills, values and attitudes to address the global challenges faced by current and future generations. Therefore, the opinions and experiences of young people are fundamental to ensure that ESD is accessible, inclusive, and relevant.

In response to the need for more meaningful youth participation and youth engagement, the <u>United Nations Economic Commission for Europe (UNECE) Steering Committee on ESD</u> - the only regional body in the UN system on Education for Sustainable Development - has recently agreed in principle (May 2023) to establish a Youth Task Force. The UNECE Youth

Task Force on ESD will be created by the end of June 2023, pending the finalisation of formal documentation.

So, what does this mean? The Youth Task Force (consisting of young people from Member States of the UNECE Region) will contribute to the implementation of the <u>UNECE Strategy</u> for Education for Sustainable Development (2021-2030), which aims to encourage countries to integrate ESD into all forms of their education systems - from primary to tertiary, including vocational, youth work, and adult learning; and through formal, non-formal and informal methods of learning.

The UNECE Youth Task Force for ESD is proposed to:

- Advise the Steering Committee (comprised of government national focal points) on all issues and activities of the Steering Committee related to young people. The Steering Committee meets at least once annually.
- Contribute to the effective mainstreaming of youth in the implementation of the UNECE Strategy for Education for Sustainable Development.
- Formulate opinions and proposals concerning the priorities and expected results for youth. Where appropriate, address these opinions and proposals to the UNECE Steering Committee on Education for Sustainable Development or other relevant stakeholders.
- Promote the UNECE's ESD youth policies within the organisation and beyond. Hold an exchange of views and report to the relevant meeting of the UNECE Steering Committee on ESD annually in order to evaluate the activities and advise the ESD Youth Platform on future priorities including possible new activities.

Members of the Youth Task Force will be designated by Governments of the UNECE Member States (including Ireland), and those selected will represent young people in their country in the Steering Committee.

"This is a welcome development", says Eimear Manning, Youth Task Force representative for Ireland. "The decision to set up a Youth Task Force on ESD shows the UNECE's acceptance of young people as both stakeholders and key actors of the 2030 Agenda. I look forward to working alongside the Steering Committee to progress the implementation of ESD over the coming months".

SDG Week forms part of the wider European Sustainable Development Week (ESDW) which this year, will run from 18 September – 8 October. Last year, ESDW saw over 7,000 events taking place across 24 countries, with over 100 events held across Ireland.

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## i. COALESCE (Collaborative Alliances for Societal Challenges) – Research Funding 2023



#### COALESCE 2024 will open on Thursday, 28 September 2023

The Irish Research Council (IRC) recently announced the fifth call under a fund for research that addresses national and global societal challenges.

COALESCE builds on and brings together two of IRCs former funding programmes, namely *Research for Policy and Society* and the *New Horizons Interdisciplinary Research Awards*.

The call seeks to fund excellent research addressing national and European/global challenges as set out in the challenge frameworks now in place. The call is run in partnership with a number of Government departments and agencies, who fund specific strands.

COALESCE 2024 will consist of the following strands:

• Strand 2A: Open call for interdisciplinary research addressing national or global societal challenges led by AHSS PI with STEM co-PI (max. €220,000 per award).

• Strand 2B: Better World Awards, in partnership with the Department of Foreign Affairs, whereby the lead PI will work with a co-PI in one of Irish Aid's partner countries – ODA-eligible country on the African continent; any ODA-eligible Small Island Developing State (SIDS); Vietnam; Palestine; Laos; Cambodia; Myanmar (max. €350,000 per award).

• Strand 1L: INSTAR+ awards, funded by the National Monuments Service of the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage in partnership with the Heritage Council (max.€220,000 per award).
