1. ESD to 2030 Updates



a. ESD to 2030 Funding for Schools

The Department of Education and Youth is now inviting applications from recognised primary and post primary schools for ESD funding for school projects during 2025/26 in the area of Education for Sustainable Development.

Priority will be given to ESD projects that include an element of Local Level Action and/ or Teacher Professional Learning. Further criteria are set out in the application form available on the ESD to 2030 webpage here: National Strategy on Education for Sustainable Development in Ireland

Funding of up to €2,500 per school is available with a total available fund of €450,000. This is a competitive process and depending on the number of applications received, not all projects might be successful.

The closing date for receipt of project submissions is close of business on **Friday 17**th **October 2025.** No late applications will be accepted under any circumstances.

b. ESD to 2030 Funding for Organisations 2025

ESD to 2030 funding of €466,000 was delivered to 21 organisations in June.

Funding of between €2,000 and €25,000 was delivered for a range of projects and programmes which focus on Capacity Building of Teachers and on Accelerating Local Level action for sustainable development.

Projects include the further development of ESD resources and materials and provision of teacher professional learning and communities of practice. A wide range of ESD programmes are included for example the Nature Explorer Programme, the Picker Pals programme, the Heritage Keepers programme, the Farmer Time programme, the Wise Water programme, the Wool in School programme and the Grow it Yourself programme. Other projects include the Climate and Nature Summit, the Rubbish Film Festival and the student led Civil Engagement Roadshow. Many of the projects include workshops for students and engagement by students with local level and community action.

c. Youth Climate Justice Funding 2025

Minister for Education and Youth, Helen McEntee TD, announced almost €500,000 in funding for youth led climate justice projects happening across Ireland in 2025.

The Youth Climate Justice Fund helps young people aged 8 to 25 to take part in projects that raise awareness and take action on climate issues.

This year's projects include:

- A hydrogen education programme providing an inclusive, hands-on approach to renewable energy learning for 100 young people.
- A programme educating young people about the causes and consequences of water scarcity and pollution using workshops, member participation, and outdoor projects.
- A climate justice debate series involving university societies and youth-led groups.
- Development of an innovative, games-based curriculum designed to educate and inspire youth aged 13-25 about climate change adaptation, empowering young people to design and implement local climate adaptation projects.

The programme includes climate education, community events, awareness campaigns, and hands-on environmental activities.

e. ESD to 2030 - 2nd Progress Report

The 2nd progress report on our ESD to 2030 implementation plan has now been published. Check out the report to see what has been happening since July 2023 in terms of each of our priority areas: Advancing Policy, Transforming Learning Environments, Capacity Building of Educators, Empowering and Mobilising Young People and Accelerating Local Level Action. The report includes case studies representing best practice in ESD across all levels of the education system.

In January 2025, the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, the Department of Education and Youth, and the Department of Children, Disability and Equality, contacted relevant bodies identified as 'Lead' actors in the ESD to 2030 implementation plan, seeking updates on progress towards medium-term and ongoing actions for the second report on progress covering the period July 2023 to December 2024...

A total of 37 Government Departments, organisations and agencies, and 17 Higher Education Institutions provided updates. This qualitative information was analysed and synthesised by departmental officials, with consultation provided by the national steering group.

Featured throughout the report are case studies, which highlight effective ESD-related practices and demonstrate the rich, diverse and innovative approaches to ESD implemented at various levels of the education system nationwide.

The co-ordinating departments would like to thank the members of the ESD Steering and Advisory Groups, as well as those in the wider education community, for their ongoing support of ESD to 2030 and their valuable contributions to the report.

Together, we are building a more just, inclusive, and sustainable society through education.

2. School Updates

Editor's Note: Thank you to all the schools who sent us in updates on their activities for ESD. There is great work going on all across the country; unfortunately, we can't include all the submissions in the ESD Newsletter but here are two great examples:

a. ESD at SS Michael and Peter Junior School, Arklow

"This year we at SS. Michael and Peter Junior School Arklow have taken a special focus on biodiversity. We are working at developing our outdoor spaces to include creature friendly areas. As part of this we have installed many bird houses which we sourced the wood for, made and painted ourselves. We also repurposed an old bird house into a bird feeding station and added two beautiful cast iron bird baths and water areas.

We repainted our fences in bright colours to match our outdoor classroom seating. The addition of new planters and our beautiful new polytunnel means we can also grow our own flowers, plants, fruit and vegetables. We are busy watering and tending to them every week and are so excited to see the first seedlings beginning to sprout. We have potatoes, cabbage, lettuce and scallions. We hope the flowers will attract our friend the bee and other pollinators that we have been learning about. Each pupil in our senior infant's class has their own sunflower grown from seeds. We have 2 new bug hotels that house many creatures, something we discovered on our recent minibeast hunt for which we used our new magnifying glasses, pooters and nets. We also made a bat house to look after this nocturnal creature. We're so lucky to have the use of our local St. Mary's secondary school's extensive grounds too with its woodland trails laden with flora and fauna.

Finally, we have added some sustainable playground equipment in an effort to reduce plastic and disposable toy waste. The climbers and games tables are enjoyed by all at break times daily. As a junior school it's so important to us that our pupils learn about these important issues from a young age, they have so much information already so we live to teach them in age appropriate ways and terms. Given their age they learn best through play and hands on experience. Outdoor learning is also a huge hit with all our children so we try to get out as much as possible. We've also had some guest speakers to enrich the children's knowledge including local community groups that share their expertise and experience with us. We're so appreciative of our staff that help out in this area especially our new caretaker Declan who has a special interest in nature. Also any help we get from local groups and our community is hugely appreciated.

b. ESD at Athlone Community College

"Students and teachers in ACC had a busy year engaging and promoting sustainability. Projects ranged from planting for pollinators, making bird houses, to fast fashion.

Most notable was the project that a number of TY students undertook to raise awareness about illegal dumpling. They made a short film about illegal dumping in Westmeath, which they then used to enter the Westmeath County Council competition on waste and also the prestigious Young Reporters for the Environment international competition.

These students began regular litter picks in our locality, with local volunteer groups and also by themselves to reduce the litter in the area. The film won the Westmeath County Council competition, and they also claimed a national accolade in the Young Reporters for the Environment competition. This meant they were one of two schools in Ireland shortlisted for the international environment award. Furthermore

3. Competitions

a. May ESD Newsletter Competition – Winners

The winner of the "**Great Irish Biodiversity Book**" by Eanna Ní Lamhna is Aoife Gordon from Tyndall College in Carlow.

The winner of the **SDG competition** in the May issue of the ESD Newsletter is Helen White from Raphoe Central NS in Donegal. The competition asked for 5 actions that can be taken to reduce your own impact on climate change (SDG 13) and Helen proposed the following actions:

- 1. Walk, cycle, car pool, bus, scoot to school. We take part in Walk on Wednesdays in Raphoe Central NS. We meet at the local mart carpark and walk up with staff to the school. This is helping to reduce traffic at our school gate and reduce carbon emissions.
- 2. Use less plastic- we encourage everyone to use reusable water bottles in school. We have started to collect plastic bottles and cans as part of the 'Return' scheme, and this is raising money for our school too.
- 3. Grow more wildflowers and vegetables. We have planted lettuce, radishes, spinach and onions in our raised vegetable beds and have bought a new green house that we are very excited about using, all classes will be able to grow their own plants throughout the year.
- 4. Turn off lights and laptops in classrooms at break times when not in use. Some of the children are 'energy monitors' and they remind classes to 'switch off' when they can to reduce energy consumption in the school.
- 5. Plant more trees- we held a Plant a Planet campaign in our school this year and 120 native trees and 20 fruit trees were bought and planted by families in our school community. We also held a Christmas Emoji Quiz and raised €250 for the charity Self-help Africa to support their planting of trees in Africa.
- 6. Recycling Clothes- Christmas Jumper Swap in December encouraging a fun and eco-friendly way for families to exchange festive jumpers instead of buying new ones.
- 7. Organise a School Uniform Exchange where parents and children can donate any school uniform items they no longer need and pick up items they do need, for no charge. We held this at the start of Term 3.
- 8. Reduce, Reuse and Recycle- we have recycling bins in each classroom for paper and plastic along with a compost bin for fruit skins. We also recycle batteries, cards, ink cartridges and stamps.
- 9. Clothes Recycling- we have an annual clothes recycling day for school families and last Friday 16th May we sent over 1 tonne of clothes to be recycled while raising money for our school to spend on our school garden/outdoor area.

10. The children in 2nd & 3rd Class have researched Climate Change, read lots of wonderful fact books to complete projects in their groups. They have also created power points to present to other classes in the school.



e. BTYSTE Students Represent Ireland with Pride in Japan:

From Tokyo to Expo 2025 Osaka and Kyoto

The BT Young Scientist & Technology Exhibition (BTYSTE) delegation recently completed an inspiring journey through Japan, showcasing Ireland's innovation, creativity, and youth leadership on the global stage.

The trip began in Tokyo, where eight exceptional students—winners in each of the five BTYSTE categories for 2025, including the overall winners, and representing four different schools—came together for a truly memorable experience. Also joining the group was Helena Madigan, teacher of the winning team from Presentation School in Tralee.

At Ireland House Tokyo, the impressive new Irish Embassy, the students met Ambassador Cole and the embassy team. In a proud moment, Niall, Aimee, Ashlee, Alois, Tomás, Saoirse, Laoise, and Ciara delivered presentations to Japanese university students, showcasing their creativity, confidence, and passion for science and technology.

The group then travelled via bullet train to Osaka for two exciting days at Expo 2025, joining the Ireland at Expo team thanks to the generous support of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Ireland.

At the Ireland Pavilion, the students presented their projects and connected with local school students, strengthening Ireland-Japan ties through youth-led dialogue. They also explored the imaginative pavilions of France, Canada, and the whimsical

Jellyfish Pavilion, each offering a unique perspective on innovation and sustainability.

Expo 2025 Highlights:

- 1.3 million+ visitors in the first two weeks
- 10.4 million+ tickets sold since launch
- 188 pavilions, including 152 country pavilions and 8 signature pavilions
- 158 participating nations and regions

The second and final day at Expo was a standout moment. The students showcased their projects to a distinguished audience, including James Lawless, Minister of State at the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science.

"Huge thanks to @IrelandatExpo for hosting us and highlighting the incredible talent of these young minds," said Mari Cahalane, Head of BTYSTE. "We're deeply grateful to our colleagues at the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Ireland, whose support made this unforgettable journey possible."

The trip concluded in Kyoto, a city of stunning temples, serene gardens, and rich cultural heritage. "Kyoto was the perfect way to end the trip—an inspiring city that reminded us of the importance of history, culture, and reflection," said Mari.



f. Young Environmentalist Award 2025 Winners

ECO-UNESCO's Young Environmentalist Awards 2025 Ceremony took place on 8th May in the Convention Centre in Dublin with 104 shortlisted projects in 11 categories including Biodviersity, ECO- Art and Design, ECO-Health and Wellbeing and ECO-Entrepreneurship. The overall winners were:

Super Junior Category: What can Athlone learn? Ardnagrath's Green Team returns! from Ard Na gCraith N.S. in Co. Westmeath. The team focused on littering in Athlone town and met with local counsellors to discuss litter blackspots and the number of public waste bins. They researched how other cities manage waste and inspired by the Return Scheme, they designed and built a prototype bin that can recognise and separate recyclable and non-recyclable waste using a sensor. The teams interest in environmental issues grew and they worked together to create the bin using engineering, creativity, and problem-solving skills. They also made sure their voices were heard through petitions, presentations and connecting with the local council, showing that they could make a difference.

Junior Category: Celbridge Youth Environmental Action Group from Salesian College in Co. Kildare. This local Celbridge group are doing many things to combat climate change locally. One such goal and the one used as their project, is to analyse their local business and give out stickers for their windows if they are Climatge friendly. This will have a great impact on the town's carbon footprint and awareness, making businesses greener while also attracting customers to them and not to those who do not meet the criteria. Local actions can have a global impact!

Senior Category: Marine Litter project from Errigal College in Co. Donegal. Bottle Back is an inspiring campaign led by a group of TY students from Errigal College in Letterkenny, aiming to tackle plastic waste by encouraging the community to "take it to the bins". Goals included raising awareness about SDGs 6, 11, 13 and 14, reducing single-use plastics, and increasing reusable bottle use in the school by 20% by the end of 2024/25. The team promoted their message through social media, local newspaper articles, and school assemblies. They also created an original "Bottle Back" song and music video which had over 5,000 views online. Recognised as Green Schools Marine Ambassadors for 2024/25, the team were set to share their campaign internationally, in Greece during an Erasmus trip.

g. Limerick and Clare ETB – Make a Switch competition winners

Students from Coláiste na Trócaire Community College, Rathkeale in Limerick have won the top prize in the first-ever Make a Switch competition for their water conservation project.

An initiative of LCETB, the competition aims to promote student-led climate action across the region. Open to all year groups in primary and post-primary, the competition focused on practical creative projects under the theme of Reduce, Reuse and Recycle, encouraging students to tackle energy, food and water waste.

Runners up in the competition were Coláiste Íde agus Josef, Abbeyfeale, for their Closing the Loop project and Coláiste Jósaef, Kilmallock, for their Worm Academy project.

Coláiste na Trócaire CC won a €1,000 Outdoor Education and Training Centre voucher and €1,000 for sustainability efforts in the school as well as a unique handcrafted trophy made from recycled materials by artists Simon Donnelly and PJ Hehir, instructors at the ETBs Colleges of Further Education and Training in Shannon and Kilrush.

The runners up both received €250 vouchers and sustainability funding.

Fedamore Community National School earned the Most Engaging Exhibit award and Limerick Community Special School won the Thinking Outside the Box Creativity award.

4. Programmes and Resources

a. Green Schools celebrate awarded schools and look ahead to the new school year



An Taisce's Green-Schools programme finished another successful school year in May, awarding 733 schools around the country with a Green Flag for their work in the areas of Litter & Waste, Biodiversity, Travel and Water, to name just a few themes.

Green-Schools is a long-term, whole school, action-based programme and award scheme for both primary and second-level schools. Green-Schools operates in approximately 90% of Irish schools and is now in its 27th year. Within the Green-Schools programme, schools work through ten sustainability themes in a consecutive order. Schools spend two academic years working on each theme before they may apply for the Green Flag award for that theme.

The 2024/25 academic year saw the return of the Energy theme, thanks to a new partnership with <u>Eirgrid</u>, who provide much needed support for the delivery of workshops to schools working on the Energy theme, as well as the development of resources for the theme.

A number of schools were also selected as 'School of the Year' at both primary and secondary levels for their outstanding work on the themes of Biodiversity, GC Marine, Water, Travel and Global Citizenship.

Green-Schools would like to congratulate all of the awarded schools for their dedication to the programme and all the work that goes into achieving their flags.

Looking ahead to the 2025/26 school year, the Green-Schools calendar is full of events, competitions and initiatives across all ten themes of the programme, aimed at primary and secondary schools. Walk to School Week is the first big event of the year, in October, followed by many others, such as Marine Week, Festival of Energy, Walk for Water events, Biodiversity Week and more. All events can be seen on the Calendar page of the Green-Schools website.

Green-Schools would also like to engage further with students at secondary level through a suite of offerings of ambassador programmes and projects for secondary students. These include the Water Ambassador Programme, #andshecycles, Let's Fix Fashion, Young Reporters for the Environment, and Climate Ambassador
Programme. Added to the suite this past year was TLDR: Global Goals Bookless

b. The ISSU 'Debate Your Decision Makers' Event



Debate Your Decision Makers (DYDM) is an event run by the Oifigeach Inbhuanaitheachta of the Irish Second Level Students Union (ISSU), it will be run in February of 2026.

DYDM is a unique opportunity for second level students to engage with their policy makers (TDs, Senators and Local Councillors) and give their input into matters that directly affect them.

The event is based on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), 17 goals set out by the United Nations to tackle environmental, social and global issues. A few examples of the goals are SDG13 Climate Action, SDG6 Gender Equality and SDG1 No Poverty. Students are asked to brainstorm barriers to certain goals i.e. Fast Fashion is a barrier to SDG12 Responsible Consumption and Production.

Then students are asked to give solutions i.e. production quota on fast fashion companies in a solution to the above barrier. These solutions become the student's demands. At the end of the day the students will present their demands to their decision makers and partake in a friendly debate with their decision makers on motions such as "The voting age should be lowered to 16".

This event helps students have their voices heard, gain and practise skills such as lobbying and make connections with policy makers and other young people from all over the country. c. Composting for Schools Programme



The Composting & Recycling for Schools Programme Is Now Open!

Tired of throwing money away??? In its 4th year, the award winning Composting & Recycling for Schools programme helps schools manage their waste more sustainably to save money and help them earn their 1st Green Flag in Litter & Waste. So far, the programme has helped over 350 schools across 13 local authority areas in Ireland. This year, 3 more local authorities are joining the programme.

The programme consists of the following steps:

- Participate in 5 x 1.25 hour online workshops (late afternoon or evening sessions available) to explore options for waste prevention and reduction, recycling, on-site composting of garden & landscape trimmings, brown bin collection of food waste, gardening and biodiversity.
- Host a site visit to discuss options and opportunities for better waste management.
- Create a tailored action plan for your school to identify a few upgrades to how you manage waste.
- Receive a €150-300 voucher to spend on recycling bins, food waste caddies, composting systems, tools and supplies that support implementation of the school's action plan.
- Host a second site visit to install the school's new recycling or composting systems and participate in any training for school staff or workshops with students.
- Bring fun and interactive learning activities into your classroom for students to learn about the underlying principles of ecology, biology and biodiversity that underpin all life on our planet.
- Participate in an interactive platform with other educators to support your efforts and access programme resources.
- Complete a survey at the end of the school year to document your accomplishments and help us improve the programme for other schools.

The Nature Explorer Schools Programme fosters active learning through play, inquiry, creativity and problem-solving. Inspired by the Forest School ethos, it supports children and their teachers to connect with nature, acquire key skills, and care for the natural world.

Classes take part in active outdoor sessions on or near their school grounds, thereby developing strong connections to local biodiversity, and learning about complex ideas such as interdependence through engaging activities that spark their curiosity and creativity.

The programme also builds the confidence and capacity of teachers, who develop skills and competencies in nature-based learning through their participation in weekly sessions that allow them to gain practical, on-the-job experience. Participating teachers and their colleagues are also supported through CPD sessions designed to help staff embed nature-based learning into their schools and teaching practice.

Global Action Plan aims to inspire people to become environmental 'change makers'. "We equip individuals and communities with knowledge and skills to develop solutions to the environmental and climate crises".

In October we plan to hold a seminar for post-primary teachers to advice and support on taking youth action. We have secured the input of youth workers to advise on taking effective action in the classroom which can be aligned to the curriculum. This is open to teachers both experienced and new to taking action for ESD".

New Research

A report by Valerie Lewis, commissioned by GET Ireland, explores Ireland's progress in implementing ESD & GCE within the education system. It highlights key policy developments, such as the ESD to 2030 strategy and the Global Citizenship Education Strategy, and examines their practical application. The report, based on insights from educators and stakeholders, identifies opportunities for increased collaboration, but also highlights challenges like limited resources and policy alignment. It provides an overview of how Ireland is working to equip learners with the skills needed to engage ethically in a globalized world. This report will be delivered at a conference in Bulgaria in October with similar research from our project partners across the EU.

b. Oide TPL/ CPD update



Primary - NEW! Social and Environmental Education (SEE)

During the coming academic year, the Oide Social and Environmental Education (SEE) team will actively support the introduction of the Primary Curriculum Framework. This framework forms the basis for high-quality teaching, learning and assessment across five broad curriculum areas. Social and Environmental Education is one of the broad curriculum areas and the team will be involved in the promotion of the core messages of the framework.

Alongside this the team are preparing for the formal launch of the SEE curriculum in the academic year 2025/2026. The draft curriculum includes geographical and historical elements, while also encompassing learning about religions, beliefs, and worldviews. At its core, it aims to empower children to view themselves as active citizens, aware of their rights and responsibilities in local, national, and global contexts.

As part of ongoing professional learning support, the SEE team hosted a webinar titled "Let's Talk About History and Geography – A Dialogic Approach" in May 2025. The session focused on how dialogue can enrich the teaching of History and Geography. The webinar highlighted how cultural understanding can be deepened through conversation. It emphasised the use of various stimuli to prompt meaningful discussions in the classroom.

In the coming months, support material for some of the pedagogies such as 'story' will be made available on the main Oide website www.oide.ie and shared via the Oide SEE X account (@Oide_SEE).

Post-primary – NEW! Climate Action and Sustainable Development (CASD)

There will be a range of professional learning experiences (PLEs) provided by the Oide CASD team for teachers in schools who have opted to introduce the new subject Leaving Certificate Climate Action and Sustainable Development from September 2025.

There will be multiple in-person professional learning experiences provided with a focus on supporting teachers with the process of engaging with and enacting the CASD curriculum. This will entail revisiting the suite of supports and key learning from previous PLEs as teachers now begin to engage with and enact the CASD curriculum with fifth year students. An important aspect of this year's professional learning will be an exploration of how to develop a culture of research and investigation in the CASD classroom that will equip students with valuable research skills, support independent learning and encourage application of knowledge to real-world scenarios both local and national.

Alongside multiple full day in-person PLEs, the online collaboratives established last year will continue to support teacher-led professional discussion relating to effective approaches to teaching, learning and assessment in the CASD classroom. These collaboratives will be provided in addition to multiple webinars which will be facilitated throughout the year to support teachers of CASD in their first year of teaching this valuable and exciting new subject.

6. HEI Sector

a. Sustainability Laboratory Certifications

Ireland is leading the way in sustainable research, with 72 Irish laboratories now officially certified for their commitment to greener practices.

On 16th July 2025, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, James Lawless TD, announced 72 sustainable laboratory certifications to research spaces in 12 higher education institutions across Ireland, under a Research Ireland-led programme.

Announcing the certifications, Minister Lawless spoke about how researchers should not only focus on exploration and discover, they should also pay attention to the impact that research has on our communities and our planet. This approach ensures that 'our pursuit of knowledge does not come at an unsustainable cost to the world around us'.

Research Ireland's Sustainable Laboratory Certification Pilot Programme was launched, in partnership with Impact Laboratories and My Green Lab, with the aim of bringing world-class sustainable research practices into Irish research labs. Research Ireland became the first national research funding body in the world to spearhead a certification process in lab sustainability, inviting Research Ireland-funded researchers to participate.

An independent evaluation of the Pilot Programme was carried out with positive results, and provided a significant number of actionable steps for Research Ireland, pilot participants, and certification providers to take forward. The report also provides resources for those beginning their journey with sustainable research. The pilot's evaluation can be found here.

c. International Health Promoting Campuses Conference 2025

The International Health Promoting Campuses Conference took place at the University of Limerick, in collaboration with Atlantic Technological University on 16th - 19th June 2025. This four-day conference gathered students, researchers, policymakers, and higher education institution (HEI) leaders from across six continents to explore emerging themes of sustainable, egalitarian and health promoting universities. Attendees included representatives from the World Health Organisation (WHO), UNESCO and the International Union for Health Promotion and Education (IUPHE).

Presented to national and international stakeholders and university leaders at the closing ceremony of the conference, *The Limerick Framework for Action* will provide future-facing guidance to inform institutional transformation in the decade ahead. The framework reflects the changed realities faced by campuses in 2025 and takes cognisance of critical international developments in this space, such as the UN Sustainable Development Goals. It is intended to support HEIs in developing comprehensive, robust approaches to embedding and furthering the healthy campus agenda.

d. Official Launch of the Springboard+ 2025 Programme



In May 2025, the Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science James Lawless officially launched the **Springboard+ 2025 programme** announcing almost 8,000 free and subsidised places on higher education courses. The initiative offers thousands of opportunities for people across Ireland to upskill or reskill, with a strong focus on 'futureproofing' careers in a rapidly evolving job market. Announcing this year's programme, Minister Lawless, said: "Springboard+ courses are specifically designed to meet current and future skills needs in industries across Ireland – upskilling participants in emerging technologies and areas where skills are needed. This year, courses are available in areas such as Infrastructure planning; Sustainable Building; Renewable Energy; Digital Skills, Cyber Security and Artificial Intelligence."

In 2025, a total of 7,719 places are available on 249 courses delivered by 37 higher education institutes nationwide. Of these 249 courses 26 are 'micro-credentials' for those interested in shorter courses to upskill in very specific areas. Springboard+ courses are at Level 6 (Certificate) to Level 9 (Masters) on the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ) and are delivered by public and private higher education providers across the country.

Applications are currently opened with courses commencing between 1st July – 31st October.

The Sustainability Champion Digital Badge

'Empowering Students to Lead on Sustainability at the University of Galway'

University of Galway is empowering students to become changemakers through its innovative Sustainability Champion Digital Badge, a co-curricular initiative that

recognises student leadership in advancing the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) on campus and beyond.

Launched in the 2024–2025 academic year, the badge forms part of the <u>University's Skills Passport</u> and is awarded to students who actively engage in sustainability through advocacy, peer education, and practical action. Students complete a combination of sustainability training, hands-on initiatives, and reflective learning. Pathways include participating in the University's flagship Community and University Sustainability Partnership (<u>CUSP</u>), joining the Students' Union Climate Crew, leading awareness campaigns in student residences, or receiving a <u>Sustainability</u> Leadership Award.

In May 2025, nine students received the badge for contributions ranging from waste reduction and energy conservation to biodiversity restoration and sustainable food advocacy. Their projects demonstrated how grassroots student action can advance institutional sustainability strategies while fostering personal and collective transformation.

"The badge is not just an award, it's a recognition of leadership and impact," said Dr Richard Manton, Director of Sustainability. "These students are already shaping a more just and sustainable future."

Recipients describe the experience as "empowering," "transformational," and "a reminder of the responsibility to lead by example." For some, it offered the opportunity to work alongside staff in a meaningful, non-tokenistic way; for others, the sense of achievement came from tangible outcomes like reducing waste by 11 tonnes annually.

By equipping students with the knowledge, skills, and confidence to act, University of Galway is embedding sustainability into the fabric of its educational mission, cultivating the next generation of ESD leaders ready to drive change in their communities and workplaces.

7. International Updates

Also in July, coinciding with the UN HLPF, the OECD published the **Policy Coherence Scan for Ireland**, as part of the OECD PCSD Project which Ireland is participating in. The Report examines Ireland's efforts to achieve the SDGs through enhanced policy coherence for sustainable development (PCSD), identifying strengths, weaknesses and possible ways forward.

The report highlights ESD to 2030 as an example of Ireland's strong culture of engaging stakeholders to foster inclusive policymaking, and it's sectoral engagement approach, providing a framework to support the education sector's contribution to a more sustainable future at individual, community, local, national and international levels



e. Children's School Lives Study

The Children's School Lives study explores the experiences of nearly 4,000 children and their parents, teachers, and school leaders in primary and special schools in Ireland. Reports published recently highlight how gender (Report 8b) and migration and ethnicity (Report 8c) shape children's educational identities, aspirations, and experiences in primary school.

The impact of Gender report reveals several gender-based disparities in children's school experiences, including:

- Girls report more positive attitudes toward school and outperform boys in literacy, yet often lack academic self-belief, especially in maths.
- Gender stereotypes persist among children, with 'good boys' associated with being intelligent and sporty, and 'good girls' associated with being kind and diligent when learning.
- Girls tend to have higher aspirations and teachers set higher expectations for them.
- Girls in all-girls schools report stronger peer connections and less bullying, while boys in single-sex schools often form popularity hierarchies.
- Co-education is seen by teachers in the case study schools as more inclusive and reflective of real life.

The impact of Migration and Ethnicity report findings include:

- Immigrant children often enjoy school and exhibit confidence in learning, with second-generation immigrants showing the highest aspirations for higher education.
- Language barriers affect literacy and social integration, while minority ethnic children, especially from poorer backgrounds, report higher anxiety and lower self-esteem.
- Many schools work to create inclusive environments, but migrant children participate less in extracurricular activities, raising concerns about their full inclusion.

Both reports emphasise the need for inclusive school environments where every child feels valued and supported, regardless of gender or background. For more insights, visit <u>cslstudy.ie</u>.

f. Safe Routes to School – 2024 Annual Report



The recently published 2024 Annual Report on the Safe Routes to School Programme shows that:

- 412 schools are currently active in the programme
- Almost 15% of schools that applied to the programme are located on "higher speed rural roads" where speed limits of 80km/ h or 100 km/h were in place
- Schools in the Programme report a 49% increase in park and stride, 36% increase in cycling, 6% increase in walking and 17% decrease in car use.

Drive a digger on a bumpy simulator, test your reflexes with a hand-eye coordination game, engage with robots and learn about technology, tackle a climbing wall, learn life-saving CPR, watch a traditional mud wall being built, or listen to trad or classical music sessions.

As well as interactive offerings, a wide range of Government supports will be explained and offered in marquees hosted by the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine, Teagasc, Bord Bia, the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, the Department of Social Protection and the Department of Rural and Community Development and the Gaeltacht.

The Village will also feature bustling marquees themed around topics such as housing, road safety, business supports, culture, creativity, education and recruitment.

h.. CSO - SDG Geohive Publications

The Central Statistics Office (CSO) has published the latest in its series of SDG indicator reports for Ireland.

The **SDG** 6 – **Clean Water and Sanitation** publication was developed in collaboration with the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) with input from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. The indicator 6.a.1 data is provided by the Department of Foreign Affairs and published on 27th June.

Key findings:


- Around 98% of wastewater received at least secondary treatment, with only 2% receiving either primary or no treatment, in 2023.
- Official Development Assistance (ODA) for water and sanitation was €0.8 million in 2023, down from €2.4 million in 2022.
- Around 80% of households were connected to the public mains water supply in 2022, up from 77% in 2016.
- Households connected to the public sewerage scheme accounted for 68.2% of all households in Census 2022, up from 65.9% recorded in Census 2016.
- Good ambient water quality was recorded in 58% of water bodies in Ireland, based on the 2016-2021 Water Framework Directive (WFD) assessment.



The **SDG 7** – **Affordable and Clean Energy** publication was developed in collaboration with SEAI and was published on 23rd July.

Key findings:

- In 2023, 40.4% of Ireland's electricity came from renewable sources, with wind accounting for 34.1% of the electricity generated.
- The renewable energy share of transport was 5.7% in 2023, with biodiesel accounting for 4.9% of this.
- Oil was the most popular type of central heating, used by almost two-fifths (38.9%) of households according to Census 2022.
- Almost a quarter of households in Dublin City (23.4%) and Galway City (22.8%) used electricity to heat their homes in 2022.
- Ireland contributed €0.7 million in 2022 to developing countries in support of clean energy research and development.
